METHODOLOGY

The Grassroot Institute of Hawai'i has contracted Anthology Research to conduct a quantitative mixed-mode study of adult residents of Hawaii. The results of the survey are intended to guide the organization's efforts in advocacy and outreach, as well as serve as a baseline for tracking progress in brand regard and community support on initiatives it considers important.

The sample for this mixed-mode survey was compiled from three sources: The sample for the Internet-based portion of the study was purchased from third party online sample providers, augmented by purchased Voter Contact Lists and Anthology's proprietary panel of Hawaii residents. The sample used to generate the telephone surveys was derived using Anthology's proprietary Random Digit Dialing software and Voter Contact Lists; both mobile and landline numbers were called.

The study began on August 16 and ended September 7, 2021. A total of n=933 completed surveys were collected during this period, stratified by island as follows. The margin of error for an overall sample of this size is +/- 3.21 percentage points with a 95% confidence level. Due to the disproportionate sampling plan, the overall data were weighted to reflect populations estimates of adults 18+ by ethnicity.

Oʻahu: n=455B.I.: n= 202

Maui County: n=167

Kauai: n=109

The questionnaire used in this study was developed by Anthology Research with input and approval from the client. The questionnaire is located in the appendix of this report.
